Program: Ticks and Diseases, More than Lyme Disease

Speaker: Benjamin Clarke, PhD. Professor Biomedical Sciences, and University of Minnesota

Medical School, Duluth

Summary: Summer is great time for exploring the woods and hiking the trails. However, there are creatures that love to hitch a ride as you walk. Ticks emerge as the snow melts and begin searching for a blood meal. They will also look for a snack in the autumn during the first freeze. Are you prepared to enjoy our beautiful outdoors free from tick bites? Join us; we will discuss ticks, where to find them, how to identify the types of ticks, and what diseases they could share with you. We will also discuss Lyme disease and other infectious diseases spread by the black-legged tick.

Program: Hawk Ridge: Counting for Conservation

Speaker: Margie Menzies, Director of Education, Hawk Ridge Observatory, Duluth MN

Summary: Hawk Ridge Bird Observatory is counting, banding and educating about migratory birds in one of the largest flyways in North America. At least 60% of migratory birds in North America use this flyway. Both fall and spring migrants are counted with a yearly average of 90,000 raptors, as well as hundreds of thousands of other birds. Join us to learn what nearly 50 years of counting and research have taught us. This will be a fun look at everything Hawk Ridge, as we compare fall and spring counts, talk bird trends, past and present, show you talons and wings, and inspire you to keep learning more about these amazing creatures.

Program: Loons: A Symbol of Northern Waters

Speaker: Eric Lemoine, Loon Watch Program Director, Sigurd Olson Institute

Summary: Many visitors and residents associate a great Northwoods experience with the haunting call of the common loon. The loon is a sentinel species—a living symbol of clean water, good fisheries and an indicator of healthy aquatic ecosystems. Since 1978, LoonWatch has been protecting common loons and their aquatic habitats through education, monitoring and research. Learn more about the common loon: their calls, ecology, behavior, habitat, threats, the impacts of climate change and other fascinating loon facts.

Program: Chequamegon Bay Birds...and How to Save Them

Summary: Birds bring joy to so many of us. Yet recent studies show alarming declines in many species, including backyard favorites like orioles, jays and juncos. Fortunately, there is hope. In this presentation, get to know the birds of the Chequamegon Bay region, how their populations are faring, why many consider this among the best birding areas in the state and actions we can take to stem declines and attract more birds to our own backyards.

Program: Meeting and Mixing the Waters: Estuaries and the Health of Lake Superior

Speaker: Deanna Erickson, Lake Superior National Estuarine Research Reserve

Summary: The estuaries along the south shore of Lake Superior are some of the most productive ecosystems in the lake. Home to diverse wetlands, flocks of birds, manoomin(wild rice) and fisheries, the river mouths that meet the lake are one of the best kept secrets for paddling, fishing and exploring. Where are these places and how do they relate to the largest lake on earth?

Program: Lake Superior Water Levels and Options to Address Coastal Hazards

Speaker: Adam Bechle, WI Sea Grant, Coastal Engineering Outreach Specialist

Summary: Lake Superior's water level has been above average for the past six years and set new monthly records in 2019 and 2020. High water levels—combined with large coastal storms—have affected beaches, bluffs, coastal homes and critical infrastructure across the Great Lakes. This presentation will provide an update on the current high water conditions on the Great Lakes, discuss the processes behind water level changes and coastal erosion, and describe some of the options that coastal land owners can take to address these issues.
